## Measuring Success

Six years ago, bold, innovative, community leaders brought together two movement-based Jewish day schools to create St. Louis' only



pluralistic Jewish independent school. They injected it with millions of dollars to ensure that its education would parallel the finest independent schools in the nation.

The success of that merger is cited nationally as an example of what is possible when a community shares a vision of what is best for children, "Even the ISACS team that awards acreditation to independent schools acknowledged that what we have achieved is nothing short of extraordinary," says Cheryl Maayan, head of school. The proof of our success is in the numbers.

**Double digit growth:** Enrollment has grown by nearly 20 percent since 2013, and that trajectory is



expected to continue. The reason is simple: 98 percent of Mirowitz parents surveyed say they are highly satisfied. This number looks

even better when compared to parent satisfaction norms at independent and public schools: 81 and 56 percent respectively. EducationNext 2017

Mirowitz prepares its students to excel at rigorous high schools and universities. (See page 7.) Current college freshmen collectively received \$65

thousand in merit scholarship and a median ACT score of 31-33. They lead youth boards and social action clubs, and resist risky behaviors.

Knowledgeable and engaged Jewish leaders: 98 percent of Mirowitz alumni say they were involved in Jewish organizations during high school. They feel informed about Israel and able to confidently take a stand. Community rabbis rely on them to teach religious school classes, to lead youth services

and to serve as youth ambassadors. "Our greatest achievement is in raising well-rounded, intelligent young leaders who are capable, confident and driven to participate in the repair of the world."

"You have power to make a difference." Our students consistently hear that message. Those lessons in affecting social change were good preparation for four Mirowitz alumni who are set to graduate from the Parkway School District this year. When the schools announced that the commencement ceremony would take place on Shavuot, they signed petitions, presented at school board meetings, spoke to the media and ultimately helped influence the district to change the date of graduation.

I, for one, was not at all surprised that these young adults - Adina, Rina, Koby and Melina — so

effectively



articulated their perspectives and engaged the board in respectful dialogue. The Parkway superintendent shared compliments about the way our alumni handled themselves. "If Mirowitz had any hand in that, you should be really proud," he said.

Our students affected change by demonstrating that they are valuable members of the Parkway community, to be counted and included. Adina emailed me during the ordeal to say, "You should know that my classmates and I feel comfortable speaking up because of the way Mirowitz raised us."

The Mirowitz faculty and I thank these leaders for representing themselves and the Jewish community with dignity and grace. We do not have to wait for our young alumni to be our leaders. They clearly already are!

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# Learning the Responsibilities of Philanthropy

During Chanukah, Mirowitz students considered the plights of children suffering from malnutrition and wild birds facing extinction. They learned about a project to bring solar energy to remote African villages, and about bilingual schools that bring Israeli and Arab children together. Then, without protest, they forfeited a night of Chanukah gifts in order to contribute money to the school's tamchui — an Aramaic word for community collection. The term dates back to medieval times when Jewish communities collected and allocated money for the most pressing needs of the moment.

"Tamchui gives Chanukah a new dimension," explains Rabbi Scott Slarskey. "The focus on giving, rather than getting, allows our students to see their own power to spread light and create miracles for others."

Each day of Chanukah, students



reflect on the beneficiary organizations they have learned about and are given two tokens to allocate to any of the five chosen organizations. So in addition to the mathematical lessons that ensue, students learn the responsibilities of philanthropy. They feel significant in their ability to improve the world. And they remember to count their blessings. "It makes me feel good to know that during Chanukah, we are actively helping people, animals and the earth," explains fifth-grader Riva Stern.







## Socially Responsible...

Mirowitz is not only a place of academic enrichment. It's a place where intelligence is combined with ethics, where Jewish tradition guides children toward goodness. This year, Mirowitz students are finding solutions to real-world problems:

## **Hurricane Relief**

**Problem:** Beth Yeshurun Day School in Houston lost most of its children's books when Hurricane Harvey flooded its library.

Solution: Mirowitz students — led by the 3rd grade — started a collection. The weekend of Rosh Hashanah, they sent more than 3,000 books to restock their shelves.

## **Speaking Out**

**Problem:** Elected officials don't often hear from their youngest constituents about the issues that matter to them.

**Solution:** Fourth graders meet with their own elected official to discuss a range of issues including animal rights, texting while driving, and tax incentives for solar energy.

## **Eliminating Waste**

**Problem:** Kindergarteners discovered that not all wrappers have a recycling symbol and worried about their impact on landfills.

Solution: The young environmentalists are collecting foil wrappers to be recycled by TerraCycle then cleaned and melted into hard plastic.

# Building a Kinder, Safer

For 17 minutes, we stood silently on Ladue Road holding signs with the names of kids and teachers who died in Parkland, Florida. People driving by honked and waved to show their support, and I was thinking that kids shouldn't have to feel unsafe in their own schools.

It was cool to be a part of something so much bigger than our small school, yet our walkout was very "Mirowitz". That day was the *Shloshim* (the end of the 30 days of mourning) for those who were killed, so we recited the Mourners' Kaddish and sang a Hebrew song about building a world of kindness before we marched down Mason Road holding signs with messages about gun violence.

I'm so glad that I go to a school that encourages me to boldly stand up for what I believe. I'm also glad that my classmates who chose not to walk out felt comfortable with



their decision, too. We may be afraid of gun violence, but my classmates and I are not afraid of people who have views that are different from ours. Everyone at this school can do what feels right without fear of judgement. I feel proud that my generation is going to be the one to make the world kinder and safer.

## All Eyes on the Sky

It was our goal on the day of the solar eclipse that Mirowitz students would go home with their eyesight intact and a robust understanding of our place on the map of the universe. In class, they learned about orbits and rotations, light and shadow. They scaled diameters of the sun and moon, measured how the eclipse impacts temperature on Earth and learned how early civilizations responded to the phenomenon.

It was our unique privilege and responsibility to also create a Jewish context for the eclipse. Hundreds of people from throughout the community joined our students for the awe-inspiring moment that included music led by Jewish musician (and Mirowitz dad) Rick Recht and lessons by Rabbi Scott Slarskey that encouraged the crowd to think about traditional morning prayers

that recognize God as "the shaper of light and creator of darkness."

If you watch the video (posted to our Facebook page), you can hear a collective gasp from the 500 people who shared the moment at Mirowitz.


